LST Flotilla FOUR - Commander T. W. GREENE, USN, Commanding - is now attached to the European Theatre of Operations under Commander Landing Craft and Bases, ELEVENTH Amphibious Force. Pennant is in the LST 266. Administration for the flotilla is aboard the flagship. Flotilla ships are now engaged in shuttle service between England and the invasion beachhead in France.

1 - 5 July 1944. The ships of the Flotilla are engaged in the Shuttle Service to the beachhead, loading troops and cargo from London, Southampton, and Portland. The return trip from the beachhead, the ships usually carry casualties, mail, and prisoners of war. Enemy air activity over the beachhead has increased; planes make a nightly appearance. LST 538 is in the 25395

London Area for repairs resulting from torpedo damage. ISTs 28 and 378 are at Falmouth, England, and Penarth, Wales, respectively, effecting repairs to damage due to collisions. On 2 July, the Flotilla Commander acted as Commodore of Convoy FCM-21 consisting of 23 LSTs and 12 Merchantmen, bound from France to various ports on the south coast of England. The passage was uneventful. The majority of the ships of this flotilla have operated on the longest possible run, loading out of the London Area and unloading on the British Assault Sector. The close of the fifth day of July marks the completion of the first month of the invasion of France. During this period the 23 ships of Flotilla FOUR have collectively operated 579 days out of a possible 690 days. The expected percentage of nonoperational days used in the planning of this operation was 25%. Our percentage of non-operational time was 7.7%. During this thirty day period, the ships have made one hundred and thirty-nine complete shuttle trips to the beachhead transporting the following:

6 - 11 July 1944. Various ships of the Flotilla are undergoing repairs in the United Kingdom, the others are busily engaged in the shuttle service to the Beachhead. The trip to the Far Shore and the return has become more or less routine. Enemy air activity over the beaches at night and occasional E-Boat and Submarine or Human Torpedo alerts are our closest contact with the enemy; however, the casualties that we evacuate from France prove the active presence of the enemy. While crossing the channel at night many of the flying bombs are observed enroute to England. At 2200 on 10 July, while lying at anchor, off Portsmouth awaiting convoy, sixteen flying bombs were counted flying at about twenty minute intervals headed for Portsmouth and Southempton. The anti aircraft put up by the shore defenses was ineffectual. The volume of fire was tremendous but aim appeared indiscriminate. One of the bombs caught fire and fell into the sea. Information is received on 10 July that LST 384 was hit by a flying bomb while at anchor at Deptford, England, on 8 July 1944. Damage to the ship was very extensive. Casualties amounted to three (3) officers and two (2) enlisted men killed and three (3) officers and two (2) enlisted men killed and three (3)

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the ship was among the fatal casualties. On 11 July, LSTs 379, 359, 360, and 266 are at the Juno Sector of the British beach-head unloading troops and equipment of the First Canadian Army.

12 July 1944. On 12 July, ISTs 359, 360, 379, and 266 are underway in Convoy FTM-35, Convoy Commodore in HMS LST 361, from the Juno Sector of the British Beachhead and bound for various English Channel Ports. At 1034, IST 359, the second ship ahead of LST 266, in column, was mined. A pronounced explosion resulted, throwing up a geyser of water that completely obscurred the ship. The 359 apparently passed over the mine before it exploded. The ship developed a slight list to starboard. A medical officer and six (6) hospital corpsmen were sent from the Flotilla Flagship to assist with the injured. IST 379, of this flotilla, went alongside and took the IST 359 in tow. HMS ISTs 199 and 157 stood by to render assistance. The British Hospital Ship #56 came up astern and despatched boats to the stricken ship and took aboard the casualties. A total of twenty (20) officers and men were injured. Convoy FTM-35 proceeded to destinatination leaving LST 359 in tow of LST 379. Arrangements were effected to provide Tug services in to the anchorage at Portsmouth on arrival, and the 359 arrived safely during the night.

The remainder of the ships are engaged in the shuttle service to the beachhead in France. The majority of the ships of the flotilla are now operating from the port of Southampton. Commander Task Force ONE TWENTY-THRME (123) has ordered the Flotilla Commander to set up headquarters ashore at Southampton after 31 July 1944. The twelve (12) new ships to be assigned to Flotilla EIGHTEEN are still enroute from the United States. The shuttle trips to the beachhead are now routine. On 27 July, the Flotilla Commander acted as Convoy Commodore for Convoy EPM-17 from Portland to France. LST 378, of this flotilla, completed repairs and has returned to the shuttle run with Convoy EPM-17.
